What is Prescription Drug Misuse and Abuse?

Prescription drug abuse refers to many things. It could mean using a medication not prescribed for you, using a medication in a manner other than prescribed (such as using more than the amount prescribed) or using a medication for the experience or feeling the drug can cause.

Common Behavioral Signs of Prescription Drug Abuse

- Taking higher doses than prescribed
- Seeking prescription from more than one doctor
- Excessive mood swings
- Increase or decrease in sleep
- Stealing, forging, or selling prescriptions
- Appearing to be high, unusually energetic or revved up, or sedated
- Continually "losing" prescription, so more prescriptions must be written

Signs & Symptoms of a Possible Problem with Painkillers

Examples: Vicodin, Oxycodone (Oxycontin), Darvon, Dilaudid, Tramadol, Demerol, Morphine, Fentanyl, Codeine, etc.

Physiological/Psychological Effects of Abuse

- Smaller (constricted) pupils
- Drowsiness
- Weakness/dizziness
- Impaired coordination
- Nausea
- Confusion
- Dry mouth
- Itching
- Sweating
- Flushed, clammy skin

Potential Health Consequences

- Slowed or arrested breathing
- Lowered pulse and blood pressure
- Tolerance
- Addiction
- Unconsciousness
- Coma
- Death (Risk of death increases when combined with alcohol or other depressants)

What Can I Do as a Community Member?

<u>Safeguard your medications</u>

- ⇒ Keep track of your meds. Count how many pills you have at any given time to check for missing pills.
- ⇒ Store your meds in a secure and dry place (not the bathroom).
- ⇒ Keep your meds out of sight. Consider using a lock box or hide medications in a discreet location in your home so they are not easy for others to find.
